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



Highlights of our accomplishments this year include:


- Issuance of accreditation from Advanc-Ed and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS)
- Implementation of a new, sliding-fee scale, rolling admission financial aid program that will help a record number of families receive ABC of NC services
- Extension of the affordable start-up "ABC-Go!" program for new families applying for financial assistance
- Initiation of a community-wide autism awareness event at a Winston-Salem Dash game
- Extension of our volunteer program to include interns from seven colleges and universities and a record 2.258 volunteer hours


Age of Students Served

Student Ethnicity












27% of ABC of NC students with autism received financial assistance in fiscal year 2010–2011 through the ABC of NC Financial Aid Program.

When Monty first started at ABC of NC, he only had about 20 words and a few signs that he used. He still ate baby food from a jar and didn't spoon feed himself. He constantly lined things up and watched wheels and ceiling fans turn. If peers or adults tried to approach him while he was playing, he'd automatically turn his back to them in an effort to shut them out.

Today, Monty seems to be a

different child. Lizzy Donovan and his team of ABC of NC teachers meticulously designed teaching strategies to help him gain strength in many areas of deficiency including diet expansion, potty training and language acquisition. Monty learned to feed himself; learned to read at the age of four for safety and for pleasure; makes verbal choices for food and clothing, art supplies, etc.; walks up to new friends to say, "Hi" and attempts to initiate play; and eats a wide variety of foods from all of the major food groups (none of which come from a jar).

Monty recently transitioned to a typical elementary school in Guilford County. He is very excited to go to school (his favorite part of the school day includes circle time and when his teachers allow him to read a book to his friends), and he is very happy to be working and playing with his new friends. One of his old friends from ABC of NC is in his class and that's an added bonus! He is doing so well that he will probably be transitioned to a typical classroom late in the fall with a shadow.

"We are so humbled by all that the school has given us: language when we couldn't find ours, encouragement when we were feeling low, tools/strategies to make life more fun and less stressful, unbelievable friendships that will last a life time, I could go on and on.
